And as if going to Germany was not enough, the Band also performed at the Ashby Churches Open Day, and we made our annual summer trip to Chatsworth; this time we were blessed with better weather than last year, but the showers were never far away! Finally, in August members of the Band helped to run a Workshop for Young Musicians as part of the 2008 Ashby Arts Festival.

Germany 2008



After the best part of 24 months of planning and preparation, Ashby Concert Band completed a fantastically successful tour of the Black Forest Region of Germany. The tour was deemed an overwhelming success by players and supporters alike. The planning provided everyone with adequate time at each of the venues to enjoy the local scenery and sights, and of course partake of the local fayre! The 750 mile journey out to Germany by coach proved to be far less tiring than expected.

The hotel in Lahr proved comfortable and convenient for each of the venues, with minimal traveling time each day. And the venues were fantastic and allowed the Band to show off their playing abilities to appreciative German audiences.

On our first day in the region we travelled to Baden-Baden to give an afternoon concert on the Kurhaus Open-Air Stage with its unique mussel-dome canopy - a prestigious venue normally occupied by the Baden-Baden Philharmonic.The Kurhaus eniovs a Belle Epoch styled elegance. Built between 1821 and 1824, by Friedrich Weinbrenner, it is a unique facility, beautifully set in the centre of the town, surrounded by the lush green wooded hills of the northern Black Forest.



The concert programme comprised two distinct halves. In the first half the Band played some classic concert band pieces, including Tall Ships (Ron Goodwin), The First Suite in Eb (Holst), Rhapsody on a Minstrel Boy (arr. Farnum), The English Folk Song Suite (Vaughan-Williams) and Choral and Rock-Out (Huggens). The second half provided more familiar pieces such as Pirates of the Caribbean, Seven Years in Tibet, Dances with Wolves, music from The Godfather and Les Miserables, finishing up with a real crowd pleaser - the Tritsch-Tratsch-Polka.

On Wednesday we travelled to Bad Krozingen via Freiburg. The stop-off in Freiburg provided an excellent opportunity to see the local sights and enjoy some typical Black Forest food, including of course ample pieces of the famous gateau! Care had to be taken not to step into the open river-courses which run through the town; according to local tradition, to step into the waters once will result in you coming back to Freiburg in the future; to step into them twice will result in you returning and marrying someone from the town; and for a lady, to step into them three times would result in you leaving Frieburg pregnant!

After avoiding 'stepping in the waters' the Band moved on to Bad Krozingen, a spa town just to the south of Freiburg. The Band gave a fantastic concert in the wonderful, new concert hall at the Spa Centre. The first half of the programme was as per Baden-Baden; the second half comprised Pirates of the Caribbean, Copacabana, Phantom of the Opera, The Godfather, Music of the Beatles, and Les Miserables, finishing up again with the Tritsch-Tratsch-Polka.



On Thursday we travelled to Lake Titisee in the southern part of the Black Forest. Titisee is a health resort with many hotels and inns. The lake is a kind of natural reservoir, whose water is dammed up by glacial moraines. It is two kilometres long and 700 metres wide and with that it is the largest natural lake in the Black Forest. It was presumably named after the Roman Emperor Titus.



The bandstand overlooks the lake and provides a ideal venue for an afternoon concert. In perfect weather, the Band played a two hour programme of light music, including The Great Race March, Musket, Fife and Drum, What A Wonderful World and Seventy-six Trombones.

Finally a huge thanks to everyone involved in making the tour a great and memorable success for the Band.

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
